Tips From the Ice Crew!

How Many Rotations?

For consistency and predictability, the rock should rotate approximately 3 - 4 times during the length of a draw shot. This is very important since the number of rotations directing impacts the speed AND curl of the shot. For example, a rock that rotates 1-2 times will stop shorter and curl more than a rock rotated 5 times. In some cases, a lot more. For league play, try to target 3-4 rotations. This means that you do not need to spin the stone when you release it. Just as you gently release the stone, gently apply the necessary handle to it.

For competitive team play, each team must agree on the rotations so that the ice measurement and sweeping tools can be consistently applied.

Split Time	Rotations	Distance	Curl
3.85	3 - 4 Rotations	Tee Line	4.0 Feet
3.85	2 Rotations	Top Twelve	4.5 Feet
3.85	5 Rotations	Back Twelve	3.0 Feet

As you can see, the same spilt time can produce three different shots (split time: the time it takes a stone to travel from the back line to the near hog line during the delivery of the stone). The Hog to Hog time will also change with different rotations.

There are times when more or less rotation is necessary. Aggressive (or flat ice) running surfaces, ice that curls over five feet or ice that runs straight. These are advanced concepts and should discussed with your team

Too Close to Call?

If it cannot be determined by device or by eye, the end is considered blanked.

Mechanical devices do not give an exact measure. Some interpretation of the dial value is necessary. It is also difficult to determine tie using mechanical device because it is not exact. Since the Laser measure, more ties are recorded since the numeric readout *could* be the exact same.

Measuring Two Rocks (standard championship procedure)

- After retrieving the measuring device, enter the house from the back with the measuring point (the part that goes in the centre hole) in your right hand.
- 2. You will measure rocks in a forward, clockwise direction to avoid "backing" into a rock. Place the centre point in the centre hole and put the measuring device on the ice 90 180 degrees from the first rock to be measured. This allows you to place the device on the ice away from the rocks to be measured.
- 3. As you approach the first rock, determine if any adjustments are needed at the end of device and make them.

 Adjustments can be made at the far end of the device to accommodate rocks in the twelve foot. Adjust the mechanical sensor to provide an accurate reading.
- 4. Measure the front of the first rock (never measure the back of the rock as rocks have different diameters), leave it in place and remember the reading on the device. The opposing vice skip should be looking as well.
- 5. Slowly move the device clockwise to the next rock, putting no downward pressure on the device.
- 6. Measure the second rock and make a decision as to which one is closer. Point to the closer rock and move the second rock either in or out depending on the result and point to the closer rock for spectators.

MAKING GREAT ICE: SOME ADVICE FOR CURLER

Curlers, we as ice techs work hard at keeping a good playing surface. But all our hard work is for nothing if you don't do your part, too.

Let's start at the door. Please use the boot boy at the front door. It's there for you to use, not to walk around. Or remove your foot wear and place on shelf (bring a second pair of clean shoes to put on). Every bit of dirt that is removed at the front door means less for people to track around once they enter the building. Yes, that applies even if you are just dropping in to watch.

Equipment:

Let's talk grippers – probably the biggest culprit in picks, next to hand and knee prints (and we'll get to that shortly). Grippers should be changed at least every season. Older, worn out grippers tend to peel off small pieces of rubber that can definitely cause picks. Also, grippers are being worn out from the inside. The teflon or metal sliders dig away at the inside of the gripper causing small pieces to break off and get onto the ice and cause picks when the sliding foot gripper is removed for throwing. How can we help 'fix this'? New grippers OR a concerted effort to keep them "new" through washing and removing small pieces of rubber about to come off. It is also recommended that players who remove a gripper/anti-slider for the purpose of delivery, should leave it on the ice as opposed to setting it up on a walkway. There is a substantive difference in the ambient temperature of the two surfaces.

Brooms should have a smooth surface on one side of the head for sliding so they will not scratch the ice. Also, brooms should be cleaned to keep the sweeping surface free of debris. You can purchase new heads when your old ones wear out. Tip: if you have a Hardline broom, use a few drops of Vim Cream and a bristle brush on the head to clean it. The head will look as good new again.

Sliders. Please cool foot wear down before sliding or walking out to your respected spot on the ice. Cool your foot wear down for at least 60 seconds and walk down the sides of the sheets. Warm foot wear tends to melt the pebble and prematurely wears down the slide path from hack all the way out to hog line and beyond. Warm is NOT GOOD. Also if your slider has any rough spots, it will scratch the ice

Clothing. A warning about new fleece: the first week after Christmas I see more picks than ever. All that new clothing is losing fluff like crazy. Do yourself and your fellow curlers a big favour: wash it before you wear it.

Hands and knees – this one is pretty easy. Body temperature will melt ice. Keep the warm parts off it. Sorry, curlers. I'm sure this is nothing you haven't been told already.

Without a doubt, a knee print causes the greatest amount of damage to the ice surface. This includes the thrower's stationary position at the conclusion of a delivery and a skip's/third's knee on the ice in the house while calling line. Any stationary contact over 3 seconds can raise the temperature as much as 3 degrees Celsius. This renders that spot "damaged" and it will not be improved until it is scraped and re-pebbled (sometime as many as three times). The damage of a hand on ice can be significant as well if left in a stationary position on the ice. The heating effects of a bare hand on ice while the player is still sliding, is negligible.

These "Flat Spots" can result in unpredictable curl by slowing the stone and causing the stone to be redirected.

But try to remember: new grippers, hands and knees off the ice, and we don't care if your feet are dirty, but your shoes had better be clean.

One last tip: HAVE FUN and SUPPORT the LOUNGE!
